

Kelly's Directories – Buckinghamshire:

Kelly's Directory (or more formally, the Kelly's, Post Office and Harrod & Co Directory) was a trade directory in England that listed all businesses and tradespeople in a particular city or town, as well as a general directory of postal addresses of local gentry, landowners, charities, and other facilities. In effect, it was a Victorian version of today's Yellow Pages.

Post Office Directory 1864 (Kelly's)

DORNEY is a village and parish, 5 miles west from Colnbrook, and 2½ miles north-west from Windsor, in the hundred and rural deanery of Burnham, union of Eton, archdeaconry of Bucks, and diocese of Oxford. The church of St. James consists of nave with aisles, chancel and west tower, containing 4 bells. The living is a vicarage, annual value £100, with residence, in the gift of the Rev. R. H. Palmer, M.A., of Dorney Court, and held by the Rev. Lambart Campbell Edwards, M.A., of Magdalen College, Oxford. The population in 1861 was 367; the acreage is 1,550.

Post Office - James Grove, receiver. Letters arrive through Windsor at 8 a.m.; dispatched at 5 p.m. The nearest money order office is at Eton.

DORNEY is a village and parish 2 miles west from Eton, 2 ½ miles north-west from Windsor and 2 from Taplow station, in the hundred of Burnham, union of Eton, county court district of Windsor, rural deanery of Burnham, archdeaconry of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford, on the north bank of the Thames. The church of St. James consists of chancel, nave and a western tower containing 4 bells; the tower is Late Perpendicular work of brick, and the other parts of the church are partly of the same date and partly Decorated; the east window is stained; in the church is a monument to Sir William Garrard, 1607. The register dates from 1726. The living is a Vicarage, yearly value £100 in the gift of Sir Charles James Palmer bart. and held since 1868 by the Rev. Erasmus Valentine Mason M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. P. Sedding left money producing £10 16s, 4d. yearly for the poor, and E. Sedding money yielding £7 10s. 4d. yearly for poor widows. Dorney Court is an ancient mansion and contains many curious portraits and an illuminated pedigree of the Palmer family, who have been the owners since 1611 the present representative being Sir Charles James Palmer bart. D.L.; J.P. lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is light: subsoil gravel. The chief crops are oats, wheat, barley, peas and beans. The area is 1,550 acres; rateable value; £2,463; the population in 1881 was 318.
