

Kelly's Directories – Buckinghamshire:

Kelly's Directory (or more formally, the Kelly's, Post Office and Harrod & Co Directory) was a trade directory in England that listed all businesses and tradespeople in a particular city or town, as well as a general directory of postal addresses of local gentry, landowners, charities, and other facilities. In effect, it was a version of today's Yellow Pages.

Kelly's Directory 1924

DORNEY is a village and parish on the north bank of the Thames, 1 ½ miles south-east from Taplow station on the main line of the Great Western railway, 1 ½ miles west from Eton and 3 north-west from Windsor, in the Wycombe division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Burnham, union of Eton, county court district of Windsor, rural deanery of Burnham, archdeaconry of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford. The church of St. James consists of chancel, nave, north chapel, south porch and an embattled western tower of the Tudor period, containing 4 bells : portions of the church date from the 12th century : there is a west gallery, bearing the date 1634 : the font is Norman : the east window is stained : in the north chapel is a fine monument with effigies of Sir William Garrard kt. ob. Nov. 17, 1607, his wife and their 15 children : under the gallery is a small stained glass window which contains a picture of Charles I. inserted in his honour in accordance with the will of J. H. Moriarty, Lieut. R.G.A. who was killed in action in 1915 : there is a litany desk presented to the church in memory of five men connected with the parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18 ; on this desk is a brass plate with the names of the men inscribed : there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, with residence, in the gift of Col. C. H. D. Palmer, and held since 1914 by the Rev. James Henry Moriarty A.K.C.L., R.N. Mrs. Parker Sedding left money producing £10 16s. 4d. yearly for the poor, and Mrs. Elizabeth Sedding, money yielding £7 10s 4d. yearly for poor widows. Dorney Court is an ancient mansion and contains many curious portraits, and an illuminated pedigree of the Palmer family, who have been the owners since 1611, the present representative being Col. Charles Henry Dayrell Palmer, who is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is light; subsoil, gravel. The chief crops are oats, wheat, barley, peas and beans. The area is 1,111 acres of land and 22 of water; rateable value, £2,554 ; the population in 1911 was 262.
