held the nineteenth day of October in the fifth  
year of the reign of Lord William and Lady  
Mary of England &c. and the year of Our Lord  
1693 before Thomas Staples, esquire, steward there.

Presentments at Court baron } Imprimis we present John Seeles late of Burnham  
for that he the seven and twentieth day of August  
1693 with force and arms did break the Pound of  
Dorney aforesaid and take out one mare, therefore  
he is in mercy 20s.

Orders of the Court baron } Imprimis it is ordered that no cottages<sup>n</sup> within  
the manor aforesaid shall exceed the usual stint  
of keeping two neat beasts in the Common and  
common fields of Dorney and Boveney aforesaid for  
and in right of his cottage upon pain of  
forfeiture for every beast so kept contrary to  
this order three shillings.

Item it is ordered that no cottages<sup>n</sup> within the  
manor aforesaid shall take in any foreigner's  
cattle to pasture in the Common or common fields  
of the manor aforesaid upon pain of forfeiting  
for every beast so taken in the sum of 5s.

Item it is ordered that every cottager or  
others that shall not have or keep their sting<sup>l</sup> of  
beasts or horse in the Common or common fields of  
Dorney aforesaid according to the allowance shall  
yearly be paid the sum of 3s. for every beast out

of a tax to be made upon the several owners of cattle of others depastured in the Common or common fields aforesaid and to be paid within fourteen days after this court upon pain of forfeiting six shillings and eight pence per head for all the cattle of every owner so depastured as aforesaid, the rate to be made by the Churchwardens of Dorney and by them to be gathered

Item it is ordered that no inhabitant within the manor aforesaid shall keep above six horses upon pain of forfeiting for every horse kept contrary to this order ten shillings.

Item it is ordered that every inhabitant that shall not keep his full stint of horse may have the liberty of keeping a cow in lieu of every horse wanting of their stint.

Item it is ordered that no inhabitant within the manor aforesaid shall exceed the accustomed stint of keeping one ewe and lamb for one acre in the fallow-field from Lady-Day to Bartholomew Day or three dry sheep for two acres and so proportionably for every greater or lesser number he or they shall possess, upon pain of forfeiture for every ewe and lamb or dry sheep kept contrary to this order one shilling.

Item it is ordered that no person shall put in any sheep in the fallow-fields for Lands Ends upon pain of forfeiting for every sheep for every time offending one shilling.

Item it is ordered that none shall keep sheep upon the wheat stubble field until Bartholomew Day nor into the barley stubble field until Michaelmas except one barley stubble field which shall be ordered by the Churchwardens nor into the meadows

until the first day of November nor into the Green until the five and twentieth day of December upon pain of forfeiting six pence for every sheep.

Item it is ordered that the several inhabitants of Dorney aforesaid do repair their several fences in the Commons and common fields within ten days next ensuing this Court upon pain of forfeiting for every pole or gate or gap not sufficiently repaired the sum of one shilling and the same from time to time to keep in sufficient repair under the like penalty.

Item it is ordered that no person shall put in any sheep in the common-fields that are to lie fallow from the tenth of March until our Lady-Day upon pain of forfeiting 6d. a sheep.

Item it is ordered that every one of the inhabitants of Dorney shall cleanse or scour their ditches in the Common, common meads or common fields that are any annoyance to the inhabitants upon pain of forfeiting twelve pence the pole if not scoured within one month after this court.

Item it is ordered by the inhabitants of Dorney that the Churchwardens of Dorney shall make a rate for the repairing the Thames bank amounting to fifty shillings which shall be equally based upon such lands as are dampnified by the waters breaking over the same, and if any person, refuse to pay his rate so taxed by the Churchwardens as aforesaid to forfeit double the said rate.

Item it is ordered that it shall be lawful to dig stuff to repair the Thamesbank by the bank side where it shall want.

Item it is ordered that the Hayward shall have

two pence for every hog or pig above two months old that shall be found unrunge after two days notice given to the owners thereof.

We the Jury and inhabitants of the Liberty of Boveney do agree to these orders above written.

Orders of the court     )     Imprimis it is ordered that no barge horses shall come on the Thames bank in passing and re-passing to and from the City of London under the penalty of forfeiting 5s. by the owner of every team.

Item it is ordered that Richard Sedding, John Harding, John Warwick, William Barr, Andrew Brothers, John Dollin do meet at Dorney Court House the first Monday in every month by nine of the clock in the morning of the same day between this court and the first day of March next ensuing to set out every man's lands in the common fields and the owners and renters of the lands do find stakes every man to forfeit two shillings and six pence for every one not meeting at

the day and place aforesaid. (of. no. 32)

Item it is ordered that all the orders made at the two last courts do stand in force under the penalties therein contained
