Imprimis we confirm all orders made the precedent courts in relation to the Common.

Item we order that all the inhabitants of Dorney and Boveney do thoroughly amend and repair their fences between this and 15th day of this instant October on penalty of one shilling per pole or gap therein unfenced.

Item we order that Mr. Thomas Lee do fill up the piece of ground called the Hemplott which the 6 persons appointed by the last court adjudged an encroachment on Mr. William Grover and ordered by them to be filled up by Michaelmas last past, and it being now undone by presentment of Thomas Finch, Michael Clerk, Ralph Weston and John Webb 4 of the persons therein appointed and Jurors of this court

for Boveney we now order him the said Thomas Lee to fill up the same of Lady Day next on pain of five pounds if therein undone.

Whereas great uneasiness hath arose through the ratement made for the reparation of the Thames banks the precedent courts and all tenants of Mrs. Jane Palmer in her own as well as son Charles's right obliged by their respective leases ^{on} covenant^s to repair their banks as oft as necessary, we do therefore now order all freeholders to amend their banks as well as tenants at their own proper cost and charge by Christmas next on penalty of fifty pounds per head or a greater sum in respect of the damage accrued by such neglect to others who have repaired their banking, and we do appoint Richard Seding, Michael Clerk and Henry Messenger Overseers of such work and of the neglect and the damage thereupon ensuing and they to make complaint to the steward of these courts as oft as requisite that the penalty may be levied on transgressors and the damage suffered is to be adjusted by the Jury of the said court and the sufferers to receive in proportion to their respective losses the sum levied.

Item we order that no foreigners cattle, horse, cows or sheep, be permitted depasturage in the Common or common fields on penalty of five shillings for each horse and cow and 6d every sheep and so as often as they do it.

Item William Grover, Chapel-warden of Boveney presenteth on oath Richard Sedding and Thomas Lee for refusing to pay the rate allowed to such cottagers who do not stock their commons.

Item Thomas White confesseth in open court that he hath let 2 cow commons to Thomas Lee contrary to the orders of the last court and we amerce each thirteen shillings and fourpence.

Item Ralph Weston confesseth in open court that he hath let two cow commons to Thames Lee contrary to the orders of the last court and we amerce each thirteen shillings and fourpence.

Item Francis Gibbins let to Thomas Lee two cow commons and is presented by the Hayward of the said manors and we amerce each of them thirteen shillings and fourpence

Item Thomas Lee hath incurred the penalty of five pounds for not filling up a piece of ground called the Hemplott pursuant to the orders of last

court.

Item we order that all sheep be taken out of the common fields no later than (? Friday) the 24th of February on penalty of 6d. a sheep for all left in contrary to the order.

Item we present Michael Clerke for taking in five cows and ^{two} ten horses foreigners' cattle and require the steward of the said court to levy the sum of one pound fifteen shillings upon him.

Item. We amerce Richard Webb for taking in two cows foreigners cattle
Item we amerce the Widow Fellows for taking one cow foreigners cattle.

Item we order that Richard Seding and William Grover do within 7 days take a view of all fences out of repair and make a due return of the same to the steward of these courts (and fix) the penalty of one shilling for every pole and gap unmended and from time to time to continue their view and make a presentment of all defaults in order for the levying the penalty aforementioned on all transgressors.

Item we repeat the former order in relation to one inhabitant not taking of another and we give leave that inhabitants let and take one from another their commons at the best price and advantage and no allowance for commons unstocked.

Item we the Jury of the said manors by (? order) and consent of the steward on behalf of the Lady do order that the Surveyors dig anywhere on the Commons or wastes for gravel for the reparation of the highways.

Item we do agree that the steward of these courts keep one horse on the Common without any penalty to accrue.

Item we the Jury by (? order) and consent of the steward in behalf of the Lady of the said manors do agree and order that no certificate persons shall be

preferred to a real inhabitant of these manors and be accepted as a tenant to the Lady or any of us, on penalty of five pounds to the poor of the parishes of Dorney & Boveney.

Item we continue Thomas White Hayward and appoint him over and above his usual fees incident to the said office the precedent courts a halfpenny in the pound and in case he is proved by any 2 persons of the said Jury guilty of any misuser or abater of the said office before the steward of the said courts he shall pay ten shillings and lose the additional profit of the said office and all persons who refuse the said fees to the Hayward on his presentment to the steward shall forfeit treble damages.

Item we agree that Mr. Dod enclose a butt of ground the west end of the said Mr. Dod's garden as far as in us lies It being on examination no detriment to any individual tenant or inhabitant, the said Mr. Dod allowing a way as usual.
