

Key Events and Issues in Dorney Parish During 2001

The *Dorney Parish News* for 2001 offers a glimpse into a year marked by community events, ongoing projects, and the persistent hum of local concerns in Dorney Parish.

Jubilee River Naming Controversy

The year began with a debate surrounding the naming of the newly constructed flood alleviation channel. While the Environment Agency insisted that the channel was simply an extension of the River Thames, many residents submitted alternative names, ranging from the whimsical ("The Royal Flush") to the more historically rooted ("Queen Elizabeth Jubilee River"). The editors of the *Dorney Parish News* expressed a preference for the straightforward "Thames Flood Channel," arguing for clarity and brevity.

Community Life and Events

The *Dorney Parish News* highlights a vibrant community life, with various organisations and events contributing to the social fabric of the parish:

- **Dorney & District Horticultural Society (DDHS):** This active society hosted several events throughout the year, including a steak pie supper, garden competitions, a summer barbecue, and an annual show. These events fostered a sense of community and provided opportunities for residents to share their passion for gardening and local produce.
- **St. James' Church:** The church served as a spiritual and social centre for the parish, offering regular services, children's activities, and special events like Lent lunches and a Parish Weekend at Lee Abbey.
- **Fundraising Efforts:** Residents participated in various fundraising activities, including carol singing, which benefited charities like Helen House Hospice for Children and SPACE, a Slough-based counselling service for young people. A Dorney girl, Natalie Randle, also ran the London Marathon to raise funds for the Thames Valley Adventure Playground.
- **Eton Wick History Group:** This group held meetings featuring talks on local history, such as the brickworks of Berkshire.

Ongoing Projects and Developments

Several infrastructure projects and developments shaped the landscape of Dorney Parish in 2001:

- **Jubilee River/Thames Flood Channel:** The completion of the flood alleviation channel, despite the naming debate, marked a significant step in managing flood risks in the area.
- **Eton College Rowing Trench:** Work on the rowing trench continued, with plans for expansion and ongoing discussions about mitigating its impact on the local community, particularly in terms of noise levels.
- **Dorney PIE (Plan to Improve the Environment):** This initiative, aimed at enhancing the parish's environmental features, was in the tendering process, with work expected to begin soon.

Persistent Local Concerns

Alongside these positive developments, the *Dorney Parish News* reveals recurring concerns that occupied the attention of the Parish Council:

- **Litter and Environmental Cleanliness:** The Parish Council requested a cleanup of the riverbanks and roadside areas, which were plagued by litter, particularly after the receding flood waters.
- **Traffic and Parking:** Concerns about speeding vehicles, particularly on Marsh Lane, and the damage caused by vehicles driving and parking on grass verges persisted. The Parish Council sought solutions like speed limits and measures to protect the verges.
- **Safety Concerns:** A resident raised concerns about the safety of the "hump" bridge on Marsh Lane, constructed for the gravel conveyor system, and whether it should be retained as a traffic calming measure. The Parish Council debated its safety and potential uses.
- **M4 Motorway Noise:** Noise pollution from the M4 motorway remained a significant issue, particularly for residents of Dorney Reach, and the Parish Council continued to advocate for mitigation measures.
- **Development Pressures:** A resident's letter highlights anxieties about the potential over-commercialisation of Dorney Court, using the example of the numerous signs advertising Christmas trees. This points to a broader concern about balancing the rural character of Dorney with commercial interests.

Community Engagement and Advocacy

Despite these challenges, the *Dorney Parish News* underscores a strong sense of community engagement and a willingness to address local concerns:

- **Parish Council Responsiveness:** The Parish Council actively engaged with residents' concerns, responding to letters, pursuing solutions to traffic and safety issues, and advocating for improvements to the local environment.
- **Resident Participation:** Residents voiced their concerns through letters to the editor and participation in Parish Council meetings. This suggests a community that actively engaged in shaping its local environment.

Conclusion

In 2001, Dorney Parish navigated a landscape of community events, infrastructural projects, and persistent local concerns. The *Dorney Parish News* provides a window into a community that celebrated its shared identity while grappling with issues that threatened its rural character and quality of life.
