Dorney Parish in 2002: A Year of Jubilee Celebrations, Community Spirit, and Local Concerns

Dorney & District Horticultural Society (DDHS): A Flourishing Community Hub

The DDHS continued to be a cornerstone of community life in Dorney, organising a wide range of events that brought residents together and fostered a shared passion for gardening:

- Cress Brook Concerns: Phyllis Wallbank, a local resident, raised concerns about the state of Cress Brook, citing issues with water levels, mud accumulation, and potential hazards for children. The Environment Agency responded to these concerns, but Ms. Wallbank remained dissatisfied with the lack of immediate action.

Community Spirit and Local Initiatives

Despite these challenges, the *Dorney Parish News* reveals a strong sense of community spirit and a willingness to address local issues through collective action:

- Dorney Neighbourhood Watch Scheme: The establishment of the Dorney Neighbourhood Watch scheme, led by Mike Hoile, aimed to enhance community safety by promoting vigilance and communication with the police.
- **Fundraising Efforts:** Various community organisations, including the DDHS and St. James' Church, organised fundraising events to support local causes and initiatives, demonstrating the community's generosity and commitment to improving the parish.
- Parish Council Engagement: The Parish Council actively sought to address residents'
 concerns and to improve the quality of life in the parish, engaging with external
 agencies, exploring solutions to local issues, and keeping residents informed through
 the Dorney Parish News.
