

## **Dorney Parish in 2006: A Year of Transition, Community Spirit, and Growing Olympic Awareness**

The year 2006 in Dorney Parish was a time of transition, marked by the arrival of a new vicar, the ongoing debate over the impact of the 2012 London Olympics, and continued efforts to address local issues. ### **The Arrival of a New Vicar: A Fresh Start for the Parish**

After a period of interregnum, the parish welcomed **Revd Lucy Holt** as its new vicar in September 2006. Revd Holt's arrival brought a renewed sense of energy and purpose to the church community. She quickly immersed herself in parish life, leading services, officiating baptisms, and engaging with residents. Her presence marked the beginning of a new chapter for the parish.

### **Dorney Lake and the 2012 Olympics: Anticipation and Apprehension**

The 2012 London Olympics cast a growing shadow over Dorney Parish in 2006. Dorney Lake, chosen as the venue for the rowing and canoe sprint events, was poised to become a global stage.

- **World Rowing Championships: A Dress Rehearsal for the Olympics:** The World Rowing Championships, held at Dorney Lake in August 2006, served as a preview of the scale and logistical complexities of the Olympics. Over 1,600 rowers from more than 60 nations participated, providing a glimpse of the international attention that Dorney would soon receive.
- **Olympic Planning and Community Concerns:** Olympic organisers began engaging with the Parish Council and residents to discuss initial plans for the Games. Concerns emerged regarding potential traffic congestion, the need for extensive parking facilities, and the potential disruption to village life during the Olympic period.
- **Traffic Management and Resident Impact:** The organisers emphasised their commitment to developing traffic management plans that minimised inconvenience to residents. They assured residents that they were working closely with local authorities and community groups to address these concerns.

### **Community Life: A Blend of Tradition and Change**

The sources paint a vivid picture of a community deeply rooted in tradition, yet adaptable to the winds of change:

- **The Dorney & District Horticultural Society (DDHS):** The DDHS remained a vital part of village life, organising its annual show, a harvest supper, and outings to notable gardens. The society also played a key role in Dorney's participation in the Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village competition, highlighting the community's dedication to maintaining its picturesque character.
- **Dorney Village Hall:** The village hall was a hub of activity, hosting events such as dance parties, a cheese and pate evening, and meetings for various local organisations. The hall's management committee played an essential role in facilitating community gatherings.
- **Dorney Over 60's Club:** The Over 60's Club provided social opportunities for older residents, fostering a sense of connection and camaraderie.

## Local Concerns and Challenges

Beyond the Olympics, several local issues captured the attention of Dorney residents:

- **M4 Motorway Noise:** The persistent noise from the M4 motorway continued to plague residents, particularly those living in Dorney Reach. The Parish Council persistently advocated for noise mitigation measures, including the resurfacing of the motorway with "quieter" materials.
- **Waste Collection and Recycling:** The introduction of a new waste collection and recycling scheme by the South Bucks District Council (SBDC) led to some initial confusion and adjustments for residents.
- **Speeding in Village Road:** Speeding vehicles on Village Road, particularly near the school, raised concerns about pedestrian safety. The Parish Council explored the possibility of installing Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) to deter speeding drivers.
- **Footpath Safety and Improvements:** The safety and condition of footpaths, especially along Marsh Lane, used by children walking to school, became a priority for the Parish Council. The Council advocated for improvements and sought funding for a new footpath connecting Harcourt Road to Dorney Lake.
- **"Ward Herbs" Site Dispute:** An ongoing planning dispute involving the "Ward Herbs" site on Lake End Road, with allegations of unauthorised activities, occupied the Parish Council's attention.

## The *Dorney Parish News*: A Mirror of Village Life
