 Dean & Canons of Windsor, Provost and Fellows of Eton College, and Nicholas Clerke (heir of Thomas Ramsey) reported for withholding rent.

6. **Property Dispute**:

- Clarification on ownership and boundaries of Robert Sheperd's tenement, noting part is in Boveney parish.
- 7. **Affeerers** (assessors of fines): William Ingby, William Wulward, John Goldynge sworn in.

8. Enforcement of Ordinances:

 William Mountagne, Mach Symson, John Goldynge and Henry Lane elected to enforce statutes and ordinances concerning the common (40d fine for failure).
